REPORT ON PREVIOUS MEETING

The History and Future of Surround

Saturday, 26^{th.} of March 2005 at SDS Sound Design Studios AG, Ostermundigen

Over 40 attendees braved family wrath and sacrificed Easter weekend holidays in order to attend the first of what we hope will be a series of Swiss AES 'Special Events' - an afternoon with Tomlinson Holman of TMH Corporation in the main auditorium of SDS Sound Design Studios in Ostermundigen/Bern. This event had been planned over a long period if time and we were glad that efforts finally came to fruition.

Tom gave a presentation that covered the history and future of surround sound and this included both early music and film soundtrack recordings, all of which being in his own inimitable style!

Disney's "Fantasia" of the late 30's and "Fantasound" is often cited as the prime example of the beginnings of surround sound but Tom was able to give the audience some more background as to where the Disney concept came from. Bell Labs in conjunction with RCA were making experimental recordings (and live events!) in the thirties using an L-C-R (or left-centre-right) microphone configuration and these were for the most part, very successful. However, Disney wanted the audience to be 'surrounded' or 'enveloped' in the sound – terms very familiar to us today when talking about surround sound – and the sound team developed stereo ambience or surround channels to create the effect. Well, well, 5.0!

In many ways, the history of surround sound is also the technical history of film and following the short-lived career of "Fantasound" due to the Second World War, it is in the 50's with the emergence of Cinemascope, Todd Ao and the other large screen formats that 4.0 and 6.0 soundtracks made their appearance using magnetic stripes on the film for 4 and 6 track audio. The former comprised 3 screen channels with a mono effects channel and the latter used 5 screen channels (as used in SDDS today).

Once again cost and reliability factors reared their heads and surround virtually disappeared from all but major presentation screens. The re-birth came when Dolby Laboratories re-worked the Sansui 4:2.:4 matrix system from the defunct Quad music system and Dolby Stereo was born. Though not the first film in the new surround format, Lucas' "Star Wars" gave it the impetus that was needed and the rest, as they say, is history! Tom then took us up to the traditional AES aperitif with an overview of current formats.

The presentation concluded with an overview of surround systems currently under development and experimentation and in particular, the 10.2 system from TMH Labs, which is receiving critical acclaim and systems have already been installed in performance venues, cinemas and private screening rooms.

The Swiss AES would like to thank Tomlinson Holman, Frederic Koenig and the staff of SDS Studios for making this Special Event such a success. The evening concluded with a buffet dinner and lively discussion at the Bären Hotel, Ostermundigen.
